May you live in interesting times is often said to be an old Chinese curse. Research doesn't show the curse is Chinese, only that it has been around since the early 1900's. No matter the origin it seems we are living in interesting times. Everywhere we look there seems to be pandemonium and panic, not to mention a pandemic. Imagine the interesting times on July 4, 1776. The Continental Congress had been working on the Declaration of Independence for a month or so. The American Revolution was well underway, it started in April 1775. But on July 4, 1776 the Continental Congress approved the final wording of the Declaration of Independence we still read today.

"We hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness". Even now we are struggling to make these Truths true. In the 1770's we threw off the yoke of Great Britain. Did Ya Know. . .

- Only John Hancock actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776.
- Congress declared Independence Day an official unpaid holiday for federal employees in 1879. In 1938 it became a paid federal holiday.
- Only two signers of the Declaration of Independence later became President of the United States. John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.
- The thirteen stars on the first American flag were in a circle so all the Colonies would appear equal.
- The first Independence day was on July 8, 1776 in Philadelphia. The ringing of the Liberty Bell summoned the citizens to the first reading of the Declaration of Independence.
- Presidents John Adams, Thomas
 Jefferson and James Monroe all died on
 the Fourth. Adams and Jefferson died
 on the same day within hours of each
 other.

America the Beautiful

America the Beautiful is one of my favorite hymns. The lovely melody and harmony blend perfectly with its poetic text. Every time I sing this song I find myself reflecting on the vivid imagery of our country's natural beauty.

The words to this hymn were written by Katharine Lee Bates who was a writer and an English professor at Wellesley College in Massachusetts. During the summer of 1893, Miss Bates took a train trip to Colorado to teach a class at Colorado College. As the train passed through the wheat fields of Kansas and the grassland of the Great Plains, Bates was inspired by the natural wonder of the world around her. Once she settled into her teaching job, she went on a trip to Pike's Peak. When she reached the top of the mountain she felt great joy and was deeply moved by the "purple mountain majesties" of the Rocky Mountains. This was the moment when the first words of the hymn were formed in her mind. By the time she left Colorado, she had completed four poetic stanzas that reflected the beauty of all the places she had experienced on her trip.

The poem was published two years later in the weekly journal, The Congregationalist, to celebrate the Fourth of July. The poem became very popular and many composers submitted melodies to accompany the famous words. The tune we all know and love was written by a church organist, Samuel A. Ward, who served at Grace Episcopal Church in Newark, New Jersey. His music, combined with Bates' poem, was first published in 1910 and received the title we know today as America the Beautiful.

As we approach this Fourth of July, 2020, our country is in the midst of another racial crisis. I would encourage us all, as Christians and Americans, to find a way to let the words of this hymn ring true in our own lives. God shed His grace for all of us around the world and in our country. May each of us find a way to extend love and compassion to one another so that true brotherhood may be found from sea to shining sea.


America! America!
